THE YATRA IN GUJARAT

Gujarat is a state of western India, boarded by the Arabian Sea. Its economic growth, which is the fastest of the country, is mainly based on industrial development, including mining, cement factories and refineries. This development leads to large-scale displacements of rural people, pollution and deforestation.



Deforestation and tree plantation. In the district of stop activists by assimilating them to violent groups. Dang, Adivasis Bheel and other Adivasis communities are cultivating land since centuries. They are now witnessing the destruction of forest due to linkages of rivers and dams projects which aim to increase the water supply to cities and industrial areas. With organizations of the region, they launched a campaign against this deforestation which is threatening the environment, their livelihood resources and their way of life. At the same time, in other districts, the Forest Department is planting trees on land that Adivasis are cultivating and for which they have made an application to get land titles under the Forest Rigts Act. On one hand, forests are destroyed, and on the other hand, trees are planted on cultivated land...

Because of the presence of social organizations struggling for the rights of people displaced by dams, sanctuaries and tourist spots, the government of Gujarat declared Dang as a violent prone region. Those who work for the displaced people are often branded as Naxalites (armed groups also called "Maoists") and put behind the bars.

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Displacements in Gujarat. During the last 50 years, around 3200000 acres (13000 ha) of land have been acquired by industries and state, leading to the displacement of 4 million people, among which 1 million belong to Adivasis communities. As no proper rehabilitation plan has been proposed by the government, most of these people finally settled in urban areas. How many of them are living in slums now?

THE YATRA IN RAJASTHAN

Rajasthan is a state in the Northwest part of India, well-known for its forts which attract many tourists in cities like Jaipur, Jaisalmer, Udaipur... Agricultural and pastoral activities are the base of the economy of this state where 80 % of the population lives in rural areas. Several factors, like drought, but also land acquisitions for industrial or infrastructure development, are pushing a large part of rural population into poverty and food insecurity.



The difficulty to claim for rights. Dungarpur is the The government is misleading the farmers. In the most backward district of Rajasthan. This area dominated by Bheel tribes didn't get the benefit of any governmental development schemes. Land is acquired for infrastructure projects, like the Udaipur-Mumbai national highway or the Udaipur-Ahmadabad railway track. People of the region claimed land titles under the Forest Rights Act, but the process is very difficult. First, because the administrative procedure to claim land is complex, requiring many papers and certifications from different instances. Secondly, because corruption is affecting the all system, and bribes are demanded by the local administration, the forest department, etc. Therefore, for a person who received few or no education and who is poor, claiming for its rights is really challenging.

district of Chittaurgarh, the Indira Sagar dam was built to provide water to the farmers of the region. At the same time, the government passed an agreement with private companies to set up 29 industrial units. 14 villages have been displaced to make place for these industries. In compensation, people received 100 000 to 200 000 Rupees, but their land was sold between 2 to 4 million Rupees to the private companies. Farmers who were not displaced can't irrigate their land, as the dam is in fact supplying the industries. Those who dared to oppose this process have been charged with false cases framed by the government.



Against a project of extension. On July 7th, the yatra attended a meeting in the village of Bilanda. Two years ago, Aditya Birla Cement factory was established in the area. The activity of the factory is polluting, creating health problem to local people and affecting the crops of farmers, who see their production decreasing. The company is now asking the government to allocate 1000 acres more for its extension project. Farmers of the village fear the consequence it would have on them, and therefore launched a movement to counter this project. The government is stating in favour of the company.



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
